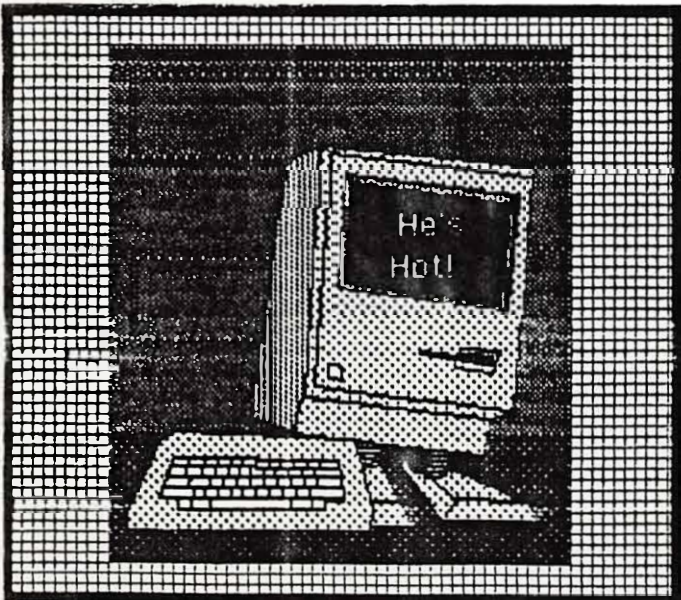
Jane Burch is organizing a computer faire. This is to take place sometime in February. I am sure that she would like any comments, help, or suggestions to help her out with this effort.

cataloger around. It's been released in a commercial version called DiskQuick. The shareware version is available in the library.

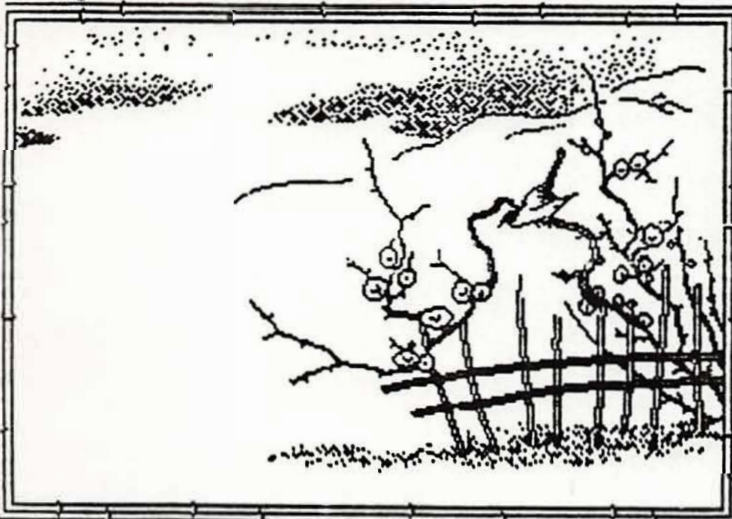
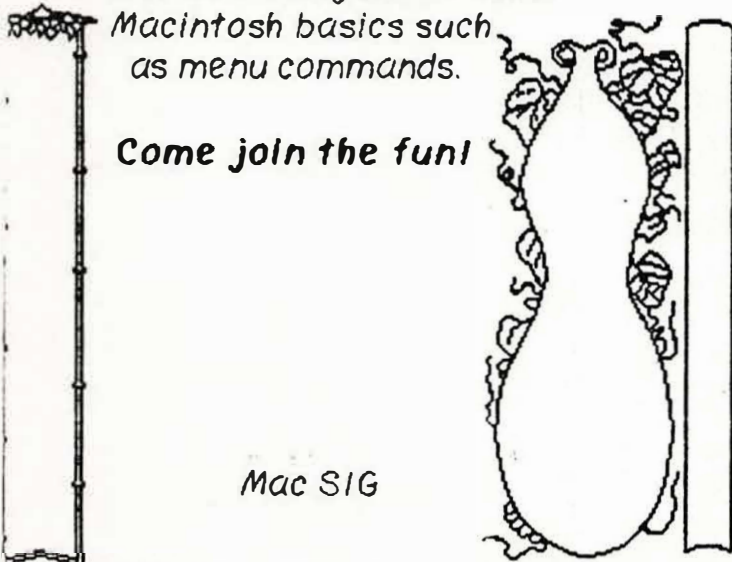
Another favorite was IconExchanger which, in addition to letting you exchange icons, also lets you change the Mac startup message (assuming you don't have a start up screen on the disk).

According to the Census Bureau's Current Population Survey for the year 1986, there is a strong correlation between

EDUCATION & SALARIES

In 1986 the average annual earnings of men who only completed one to three years of high school was \$19,923, and for the high school graduate the figure rose to \$23,759.

The figures for an investment in a college education are more dramatic. Men who completed one to three years of college had an average salary of \$28,114. Men who completed a B.A. degree averaged \$37,538, and the average man with a graduate degree was \$46,286.

For women with the same levels of education the range is from an average of \$10,882 (with 3 years of high school) to an average of \$28,629 (with a graduate degree). It does not require a strong background in statistics to see that these figures point to one message:

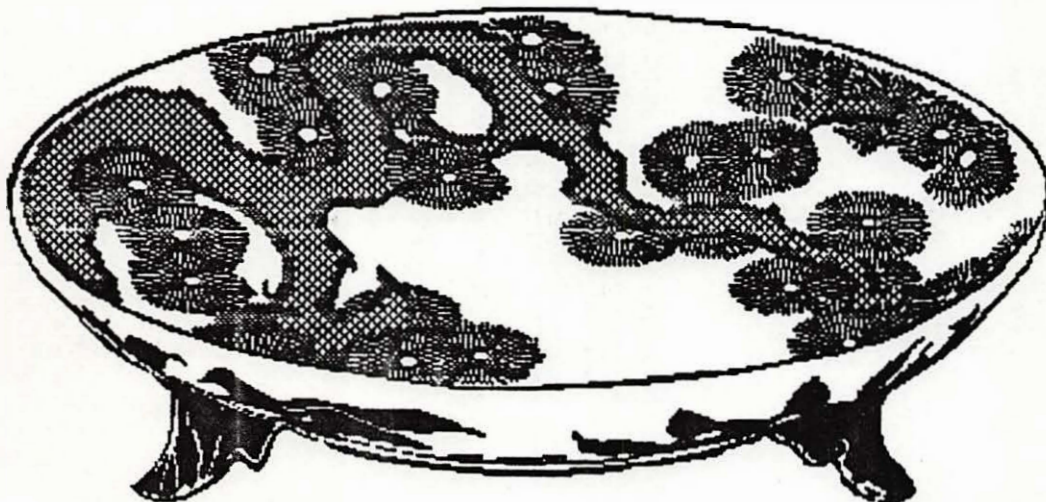

My Computer's the Best

Are you thinking of buying your first computer? If you ask around, most everybody will tell you to buy their brand of computer. They say "My computer's the best." Sometimes people ask me "What is the best computer to buy?" Well, there is no best computer. What you should try to find is the best computer for you.

When a person decides to buy a computer he usually eventually spends about one to two thousand dollars. This is a major purchase. When that amount of money is spent people get very defensive about their choice. Suddenly they feel a need to prove to everyone that their computer can out perform everybody else's, and in every function.

When you are buying a computer avoid advice from anyone who tells you "This computer is the best." Often you will end up with a computer that is good for your friend, but not the best for you.

The other route that many people take is to look at the technical specifications of the computer. Does the computer have an 8, 16, or 32 bit microprocessor? What is the size of the internal memory? What kind of disk drives does it have? What is the clock speed?

The problem with this is, most people have no idea what all these things mean. If you do have an idea then you should realize that while the hardware does have an effect on the computer, the systems and applications software are just as important. If you don't have any idea what I'm talking about this should tell you that that approach is wrong for you.

So, how does the novice make a good choice on a first time computer purchase. I suggest you follow this step by step procedure in making your choice.

- 1) Find out what kinds of things computers do and make a list.
- 2) Decide which things you would like to do on your computer now and over the next three years.
- 3) Prioritize the list.
- 4) Find computer programs that do the top things on your list the well.
- 5) Use each program for at least an hour so you can be sure it's what you want.
- 6) Select the computer that runs the programs you like best.
- 7) If your computer is used in business consider how it will be connected to other computers at work. (If your main purpose is to use the computer for work consider getting a compatible computer.)

The computer club offers you an excellent opportunity to follow those steps. I suggest that you use the assets of the club to follow this procedure before you decide which computer is **best for you**.
